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NATIONAL HEALTH & PHYSICAL EDUCATION REPORT

Hello fellow Turners. Here we are again heading into another Holiday season and looking toward 2022. I sincerely hope 2022 is the year we all get back to a normal lifestyle.

We are planning on having national events in 2022 - Monaca Turners will be hosting the National Golf Tournament, Ft. Wayne Turners the National Softball Tournament and Syracuse Turners the National Bowling Tournament. I also want you to look a little farther into the future and start planning for the American Turners 56th National Festival at New Ulm Turners in 2023! New Ulm is a wonderful little town in Minnesota, rich in Turner history. I invite everyone to join us for all of the friendly competition, gemütlichkeit and New Ulm Turner hospitality.

On the subject of the next National Festival, there are some changes to the Festival Rulebook.

- Start competition on Wednesday morning. Evenings will just be used for Princess Pageant, Model Drill and Mass Drill competitions and social events at the Turner hall.
- New age groups for Pickleball 18-29, 30-49, 50-69 & 70+
- Volleyball divisions eliminate the Sr. Women 50+ and the Sr. Men 55+ due to lack of participation. Players in those ages still can play on Women 14+, Men 14+, Co-ed 18+ and/or Sr. Co-ed (women 50+ & men 55+)
- Eliminate team trophies/plaques for volleyball. Instead of giving ribbons to the players, give medals to all players of the top 3 winning teams in each division.
- Reduce the volleyball team sizes to 8 players plus 2 alternates. An alternate can only play if it is determined before a match starts that an alternate is needed.
- All-around medals will be given to everyone in the events of Gymnastics and Track & Field (all ages).
- Change the 4x50 running relay for Seniors to a 4x100, like the other age groups.
- Men's gymnastics, ages 7-29, will compete all 6 events for an all-around score.
- Competition levels for Women's gymnastics, ages 7-29, will now include the USAG Development Program levels 3-10 and all Xcel levels.
- Entry fee for athletic competitors at the National Festival will be raised to \$25 per person.

ENDOWMENT TRUST

Dear Turners.

The Endowment Trust Fund is one of the financial arms of American Turners. The ETF is funded through endowments and memorials. The Endowment Trust carriers out the organization's mission of a Sound Mind, Sound Body through offering various gymnastics and physical education grants, scholarships, and donations provided to Districts and Societies within American Turners. The Endowment Trust Fund is managed by six Trustees and the American Turner's National President following rules and regulations found in its Declaration of Trust. The Endowment Trustees are open to new ideas and suggestions as to how we may best serve the membership of American Turners and perpetuate "A Sound Mind and a Sound Body"

On behalf of the Trustees, I'm please to inform you of the following changes of the Endowment Trust offerings which take effect **January 1, 2022**. These are:

- 1. Elimination of the loan program which had been on hold for the past 2 years.
- 2. An increase of the maximum amount payable by the Endowment Trust to \$3,000 for the Society Payroll Reimbursement Grant.
- 3. An increase the maximum amount payable by the Endowment Trust to \$2,000 for the 50/50 Physical Education Equipment Grant
- 4. New First Aid/CPR/AED Grant

REMINDER: A requesting Society must have a minimum of 50% of their competitive team members, under the age of 18, or be a <u>Youth Member</u> or a child of a member of American Turners. Youth Members are required to renew their membership annually.

New Edwin E. Colton Honorary Award

The purpose of this award is to recognize a 'grass roots' or foundation level member that has sacrificed their time and talents at their Society and/or District. This individual must have demonstrated qualities of humility, integrity, vision, tenacity, loyalty to the American Turner's cause and has possessed a strong work ethic for many years in keeping their Society and/or District functioning. The nominee shall possess a 'True American Turner Spirit' as emulated by Edwin E. Colton. A maximum of three (3) awards will be presented during each calendar year with no more than one (1) per District awarded annually.

BREAKING NEWS: 2023 NATIONAL FESTIVAL

The American Turners National Festival is coming to New Ulm in the summer of 2023. On September 23, 2021, the Turner National Council accepted the New Ulm Turners' bid to host the event -- the oldest continuing sports festival in the United States. The first Turnfest was held in 1851 in Philadelphia. Known as "The People's Olympics", the event is held once every four years, giving Turners the opportunity to compete in sports and cultural events. Although the New Ulm Turnverein is one of the oldest and most significant clubs in the United States, it has never hosted the National Festival.

One contribution of the Turners to American life has been the organization's advocacy of fitness and physical education. Their efforts encouraged the adoption of physical education into the curriculum of school systems across the country, advocating for classes for both boys and girls.

Reflecting the Turners' motto, "A Sound Mind in a Sound Body," Turnfest is divided into two areas of participation. The physical competition includes men and women's gymnastics, rhythmic gymnastics, tumbling, track and field events, swimming, diving, volleyball, golf, tennis, mass drill and model drill exhibitions. Cultural exhibitions and events include more than 100 categories from scrap books to fine art to solo and group music, speech, and dance performances. The Turners have always been a family organization and participants range from nine years of age to ninety.

William W. Hildreth




Kenny spent decades in the volleyball community as well. He was a player, volunteer, and youth coach through USA Volleyball's Heart of America Region (HOA)

Russell Goodman was active in Turner's Gymnastic Society, believing in Sound Mind-Sound Body from birth to death, a philosophy he modeled until he died. He was renowned for his one-armed lever, which to date, I've never seen anyone else do! His last competitive Turnfest was in Fort Wayne, Indiana in July 2019, when he was 85 years old. While his skills diminished over the years, he still showed up and did what he could. He loved the camaraderie at Turners, especially the "Turnfests", where he'd tell us that the only muscles that hurt were his jaws from laughing. He was easy to be with, an enjoyable person who knew the value of a good laugh and never hesitated to provide one.


During his years at Turners, he served on the board of the St. Paul Turners, ultimately as its president. He also served on the national board where he fought for and won the right for women to be full members. He was very proud of that achievement.

Russell tried to live the values he learned from his parents. He thought all people were important & deserved respect. He lived fearlessly, imaginatively with curiosity and amusement. This inquisitiveness created many opportunities for him to be an innovator on social justice issues and in his 30-year career as a social worker for the State of Minnesota. Russell told his daughters,

I've tried to live my values. All people are important and deserve respect. It is important to be fair and take risks. I lived life without fear, not recluse, but fearless, imaginative.



His granddaughter recently said, "grandpa had a way of taking the weight off you". He did. He was able to listen to your most complex problem—one you surely thought you couldn't survive, simplify it, and in so doing, lift the weight of the world off you. Russell was always willing to learn, to grow, to put himself in uncomfortable places in order to discover new things, to become a better human being, to talk things through with anyone who had issues with him. He welcomed the discussions.



Russell enjoyed his Turner friends so much and appreciated the love and concern he felt as he went through the process of dying. When he died, he was a grateful man at peace with himself. This was exemplified by the friends he made along the way. He believed


that "I am here for a purpose" and he lived his life consciously exploring how he could best serve that purpose. Upon retirement, he became a personal trainer and used his skills to train the elderly to be strong enough to live the lives they chose. He believed in social justice, volunteering in ways that helped make this community and our world a better place.

Russell was preceded in death by his wife Valeria & his daughter Cheryl (Scott) Sandrock. He is survived by daughters Laura (Michael Paymar) and Wendy; sons David (Patty) and Daniel, 10 grandchildren and 9 great grandchildren.

George Rhoades Hartzell




George Hartzell was born on February 22, 1923 and was an active Turner member all of his adult life. He fell in love with gymnastics when he learned it at a boy's club as a youth. He was an award-winning gymnast and captain of his team in high school. He competed all-around and once won first all-around and first in parallel bars at the Northwest Gymnastics meet where there were over 500 competitors. He served in the US Army from 1943-1946, but he didn't allow his military duties to dampen his love of the sport. Even there, he practiced hand-balancing with fellow servicemen out behind the barracks. He was nicknamed "the Handstand King".

After the service, George joined the St. Paul Turners. He was an athletic competitor at over 12 National Festivals (Turnfests) and won many ribbons and medals through the years. He was especially happy, winning the gold in gymnastics at his last competition in Springfield, Massachusetts in 2007, when he was 84 years old. He performed routines worthy of a much younger competitor. Pommel horse and parallel bars were his specialties as a senior gymnast. George modeled the Turner motto of "a sound mind in a sound body", setting the example of how to remain active as one ages. When any of we younger members felt like gymnastics was getting too tough at our age, we looked to George's skill and dedication and were inspired to continue.

He served on the St. Paul Turners board as a Building Trustee. During George's tenure as Building Trustee, the job included additional duties, managing a rental property next door to the old Turner hall in the historic fire barn on the West Side of St. Paul. Turners procured this adjacent house with an eye on future expansion. He also presided over the building fund, which eventually allowed the St. Paul Turners to build a new building in Mendota Heights, MN. This new facility was a state-of-the-art gymnastics facility.

George was a 30-year employee with the State of Minnesota. He loved to laugh, eat a good steak, play cribbage and bridge, and watch old western movies. George passed on June 13, 2021 and is survived by Beverly, his wife of 71 years; daughters Robyn (Steve Loop) Hartzell, Jennifer (Jim) Brau and Jody (Mike) Huba; grandsons Samuel, Elliot and Colin. George was preceded in death by his twin brother Vernon, also a gymnast and Turner member, and brothers Eugene and Howard.





Turner William Meyer



The American Turners lost one of its esteemed members on October 19, 2021. Former National President and Honor Key recipient, Turner William (Bill) Meyer, quietly passed away on that day in his home in Cary, IL in the company of his wife of 72 years and other family members. Bill was diagnosed earlier in the year with metastatic prostate cancer that had spread to his bones. He was in hospice treatment at the time of his passing.

Bill was born in Chicago to Turner Ernest Meyer and his wife, Erna, on July 30, 1926. He was survived by his wife, Dolores (94), three of his sons, Kurt (67), Karl (65) and Kenneth (55), and his daughter, Heidi (62). He had 8 grandchildren and 7 great grandchildren. He was preceded in death by his eldest son, William Meyer Jr.

Bill attended gym classes at the Chicago Turgemeide aka CTG (1933), Vorwaertz Turnverein aka Forward (1934-1956) and American Turners Northwest Chicago aka Northwest (1957-1973), in Chicago, and participated in the youth program at Illinois Turner Camp in the summer months. He competed in numerous athletic tournaments earning 3 gold medals in track and field at the Illinois District Junior competition and attending 13 National Turnfests between 1948 and 2003. He also medaled in Track and Field at the International Turnfest in Munich Germany in 1973. He played on 5 Illinois District Champion Volleyball teams between 1944-1962 and played on many District Basketball teams. He won the national singles competition at the National Bowling Tournament in Toledo Ohio in 1970 for highest series (733). He was awarded the Five Star District Physical Education Award in 1955.

Bill joined the Forward Turners as soon as he was of age to do so in 1944. He served at the society level in many capacities from the time he joined and ultimately as society President from 1954-1956. He served on the Forward Turners Finance and Building Committee from 1947-1954 and as Chairman of the Committee formed to complete the acquisition of the land (1954) on which the Northwest Turner Hall was ultimately built. He served as Chairman of the Joint Committee for Turner Consolidation (1954-1956) that culminated in the merger of the Swiss, Social and Forward Turners to form the Northwest Turners. He subsequently served on the Northwest Board of Directors and on various special committees.

At the district level, Bill served as a board member in some capacity from 1952-1962, including as Chairman of the Youth Committee (1955), Ways and Means Committee (1956-1962), Turner Camp Bar and Restaurant Committee (1957 & 1958) and Treasurer (1956-1962). He served as District Auditor from 1963-1970. For many years he was a member of the All Turner Committee, Treasure of the Memorial Swimming Pool Fund and Chairman of the committee created to seek real estate tax adjustments in 1964 and 1972. The district successfully obtained reduction in the taxes in both years. When he retired from the Illinois District Board, he continued to represent the Northwest Society as a delegate to the Illinois District Convention until 1984.

Bill also served as a delegate to most National Conventions since 1964 and served on the National Council in many capacities including:

- National Council Representative for Region 5, 1966-1968
- First Vice President, 1968-1970
- President, 1970-1974
- Past President 1974-1978
- Treasurer 1974-1977
- Endowment Fund Trustee, 1968-1976 and again 1979-2010
- Endowment Trust Treasurer 1970-1976
- Endowment Trust Secretary/Treasurer, 1988-2005
- Endowment Trust Auditor 1979-1987
- Assistant to Treasure 2005-2010
- Treasurer on the National Turnfest Committee for 6 Turnfests
- General Chairman for the American Turners entrée and travel to the International Turnfest held in Munich Germany in 1973
- Chairman of the New National Scholarship Award Committee, 1997-2005

As National President, Bill was instrumental in bringing the Elgin Turners into the national organization and while serving on the Endowment Trust Board he was instrumental in acquiring the land adjacent to the Turner Camp to serve as a buffer to the camp and for potential expansion of the camp in the future. He was awarded the National Honor Key in 1973 and awarded a 50-year honorary membership card in 1994.

A celebration of life event was held in honor of Bill on November 13, 2021, where many who spoke mentioned the indispensable leadership he brought to the Turner Organization at all levels. Former National President and Honor Key recipient Ed Colton remarked that a major challenge to the organization moving forward will be finding members who can offer the kind of leadership and commitment Bill provided.

Apart from his service, Bill was regarded by all who knew him as one from whom they could always expect a pleasant greeting and hearty laugh. When not subsumed in family or Turner business or helping a friend, he could be seen enjoying the fellowship of his many Turner friends either at the Turner Camp, which he dearly loved, or a Turner function of some kind. He was loved by people of all ages, and he will be sorely missed by the many people whose lives he touched. So, wherever Turners may congregate across the land, nothing would bring him more pleasure than to hear a hearty singing of "Ein Prosit" rising up from the earth below to make him feel part of us again. Please keep him in mind as you do that, as well as in your prayers.
